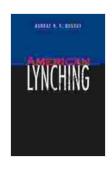
American Lynching: The Brutal History of Ashraf Rushdy

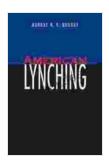

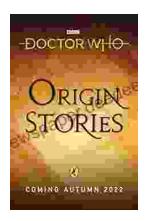
