- Ensure that all students are college and career ready. The standards are designed to provide students with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in college and the workplace.
- Improve student achievement. The standards are based on research on what students need to know and be able to do to be successful in college and the workplace.
- Close achievement gaps. The standards are designed to ensure that all students, regardless of their race, ethnicity, or socioeconomic status, have the opportunity to succeed in college and the workplace.

The Common Core ELA standards are organized into four grade bands:

- K-2
- **3-5**
- **6-8**
- **9-12**

Each grade band has its own set of standards for reading, writing, speaking and listening, and language. The standards are cumulative, meaning that students are expected to build on their knowledge and skills from year to year.

The Common Core ELA standards are assessed through a variety of methods, including:

- Classroom assessments
- District assessments
- State assessments

Classroom assessments are typically used to monitor student progress and provide feedback to students and teachers. District assessments are typically used to assess student achievement and provide data for school improvement planning. State assessments are typically used to measure student achievement and ensure that all students are meeting the state standards.

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
