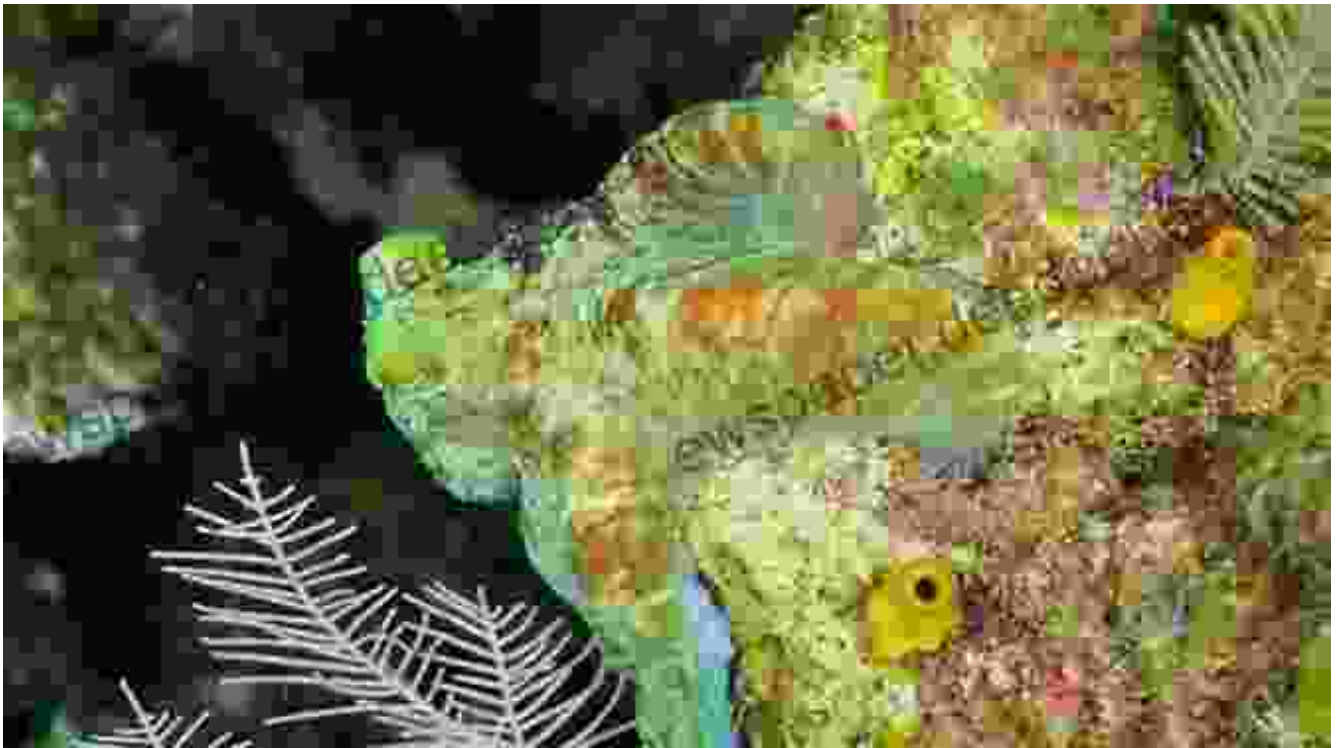

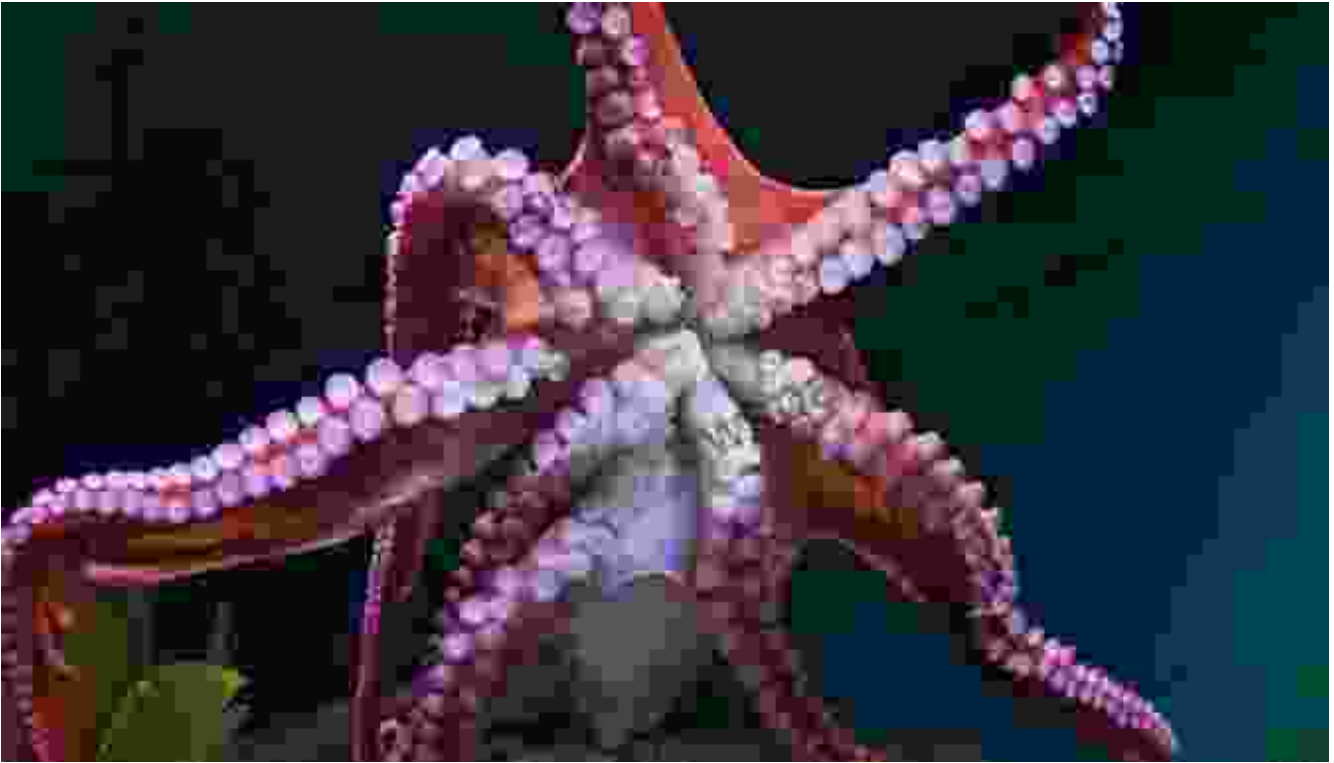

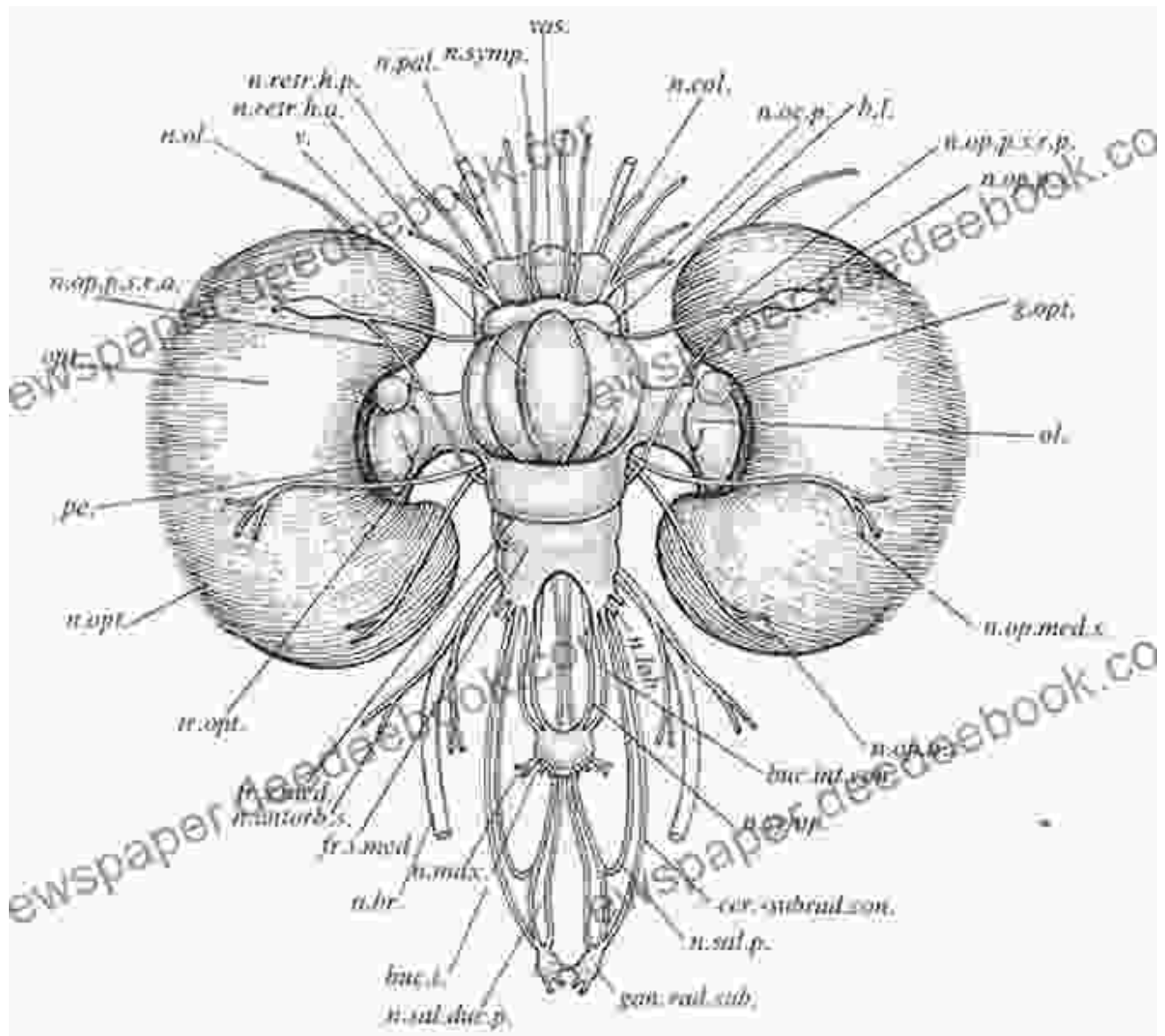


FIG. 15. Diagrammatic drawing of central nervous system of *Octopus* as seen from above (modified from Young 1964).

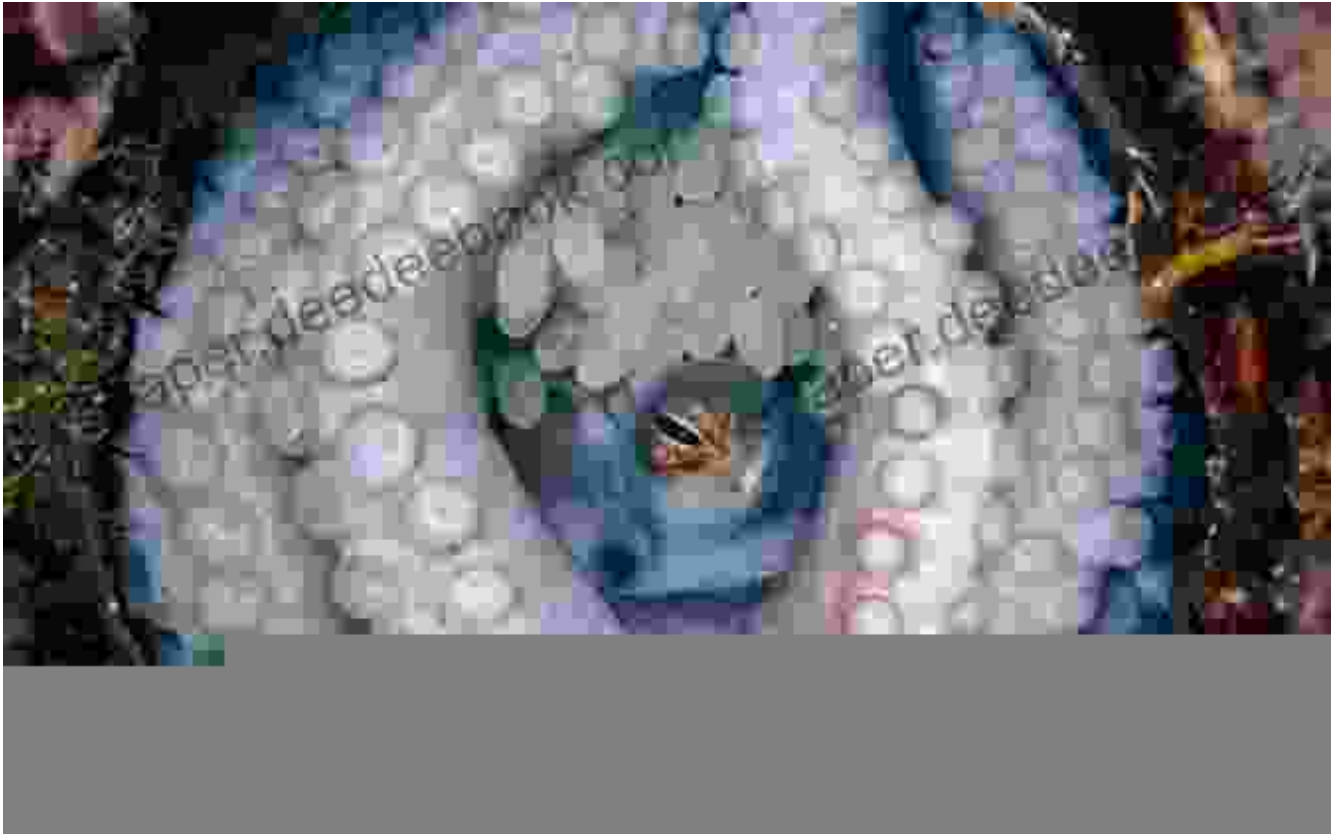

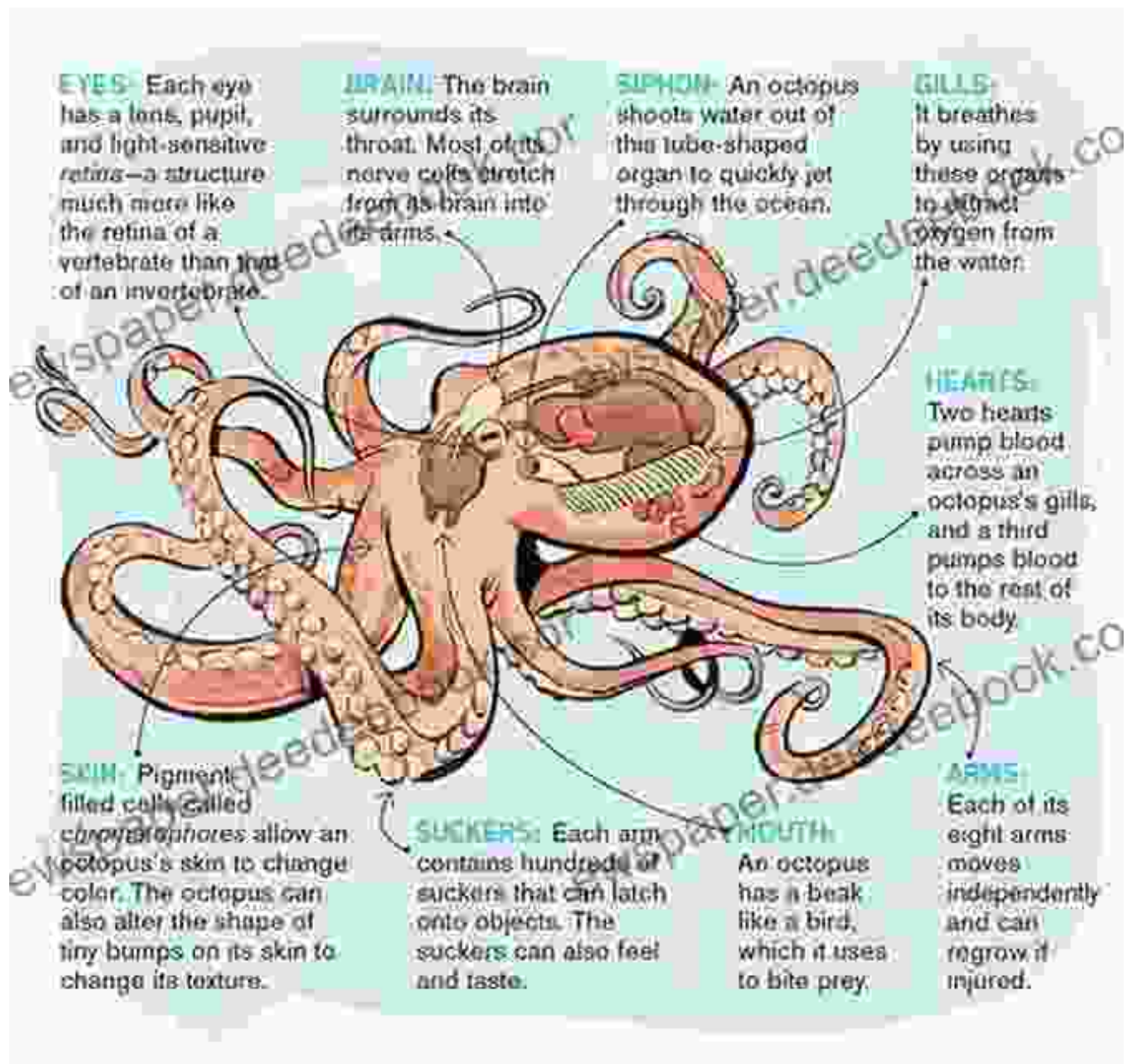

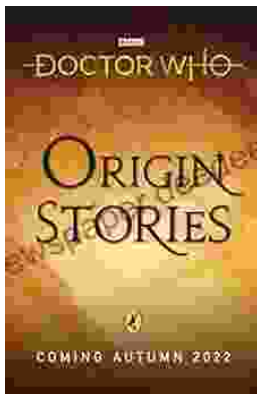
